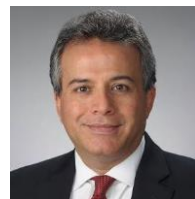
Why and How has Iranian Identity Become so Politicized?

MEHRZAD BOROUJERDI (SYRACUSE UNIVERSITY)

In this presentation, Mehrzad Boroujerdi, Professor of Political Science at Syracuse University and Visiting Scholar at UCLA's Center for Near Eastern Studies, will address the central tenants of the contested notion of Iranian identity. His lecture will analyze attempts at defining this notion, as well as the current challenges and controversies that surround it.

Mehrzad Boroujerdi is a Professor of Political Science and O'Hanley Faculty Scholar at Syracuse University. He is currently a Fellow of the American Council on Education in residence at California State University, Northridge, as well as a visiting scholar at UCLA's Center for Near Eastern Studies.

Dr. Boroujerdi's research centers on the intellectual and political history of modern Iran. He is the author of *Iranian Intellectuals and the West: The Tormented Triumph of Nativism* (1996), *I Carved, Worshipped and Shattered: Essays on Iranian Politics and Identity* [in Persian] (2010), and *Post-Revolutionary Iran: A Handbook* (forthcoming from Syracuse University Press).
